There's still time to get in your nominations for the UAA's inaugural 'Alumni of the Year' award!

Deadline: July 31, 2014

As inspiration to others, **UAA** is launching a search for two truly innovative and outstanding "Alumni of the Year" who have made unusual and significant contributions since leaving USAID. One recipient will be honored for paid or volunteer work overseas, and the other for work in the US. The awards will be presented at UAA's Annual General Meeting on Oct. 24, 2014, at the Center for Global Development in Washington, DC.

To nominate a friend or colleague or apply yourself, email awards@usaidalumni.org describing what you or your nominee have done since leaving USAID that represents innovative and transformative service in development work overseas, or in community work or the arts in the US. Tell us about the impact of the contribution and why it might be inspiring to other USAID alumni or those contemplating life after USAID. Include contact information and if possible a brief narrative bio covering both USAID and post-USAID activities. If nominating yourself, please include the names of two references knowledgeable about your post-USAID contributions.

The deadline for nominations and applications is July 31, 2014.

Applicants/nominees must be US residents able to attend the UAA AGM on Oct. 24, 2014, in Washington, DC. UAA can help defray travel expenses for winners who live outside the Washington area. Applicants/nominees must also be in one of the categories eligible to join UAA:

- Those who worked for USAID for at least two years and who left the agency in good standing, including:
 - Former Civil Servants, FSOs, FSNs, TCNs, AD and Schedule C appointees;
 and
 - Those formerly employed through interagency service agreements (PASAs, RASAs), fellowship programs (e.g. AAAS Fellows, Population Fellows), and

personal services contracts (PSCs).

The awards will celebrate the new paths taken by two outstanding alumni who may have built on their USAID experience and skills but who've chosen to work in different arenas, with different partner organizations, or on their own. The recipients will also have shown passion for new activities and made significant and lasting contributions.

Alumni Profile: Roger Carlson

Roger Carlson joined USAID in 1963 fresh out of college, eager to get involved in foreign affairs and motivated by President Kennedy's appeal to youth to join government and bring a new era of dynamism and change to public service. After initially working in the Military Assistance Division of the Agency's Planning Office his first overseas assignment was in Algeria. He convinced his former Peace Corps boss, Gail Sander, to join him there where they were married in Algiers in 1964.



As with many USAID officers in that era with a spouse safe havened, in 1967 they began a two year period of shuttling between Saigon, where Roger was a Planning Officer at Military Assistance Command, and Bangkok, where Gail was the Administrative Assistant to the Peace Corps Director. They then spent 1969-70 at the Fletcher School at Tufts University, followed by USAID assignments in Tunisia, USAID/W, studies at Stanford Graduate School of Business and then Somalia. Roger moved into the Directorship of Southern African Affairs in the mid-1980s and later in Swaziland and Mozambique.

Post retirement in 1996, he teamed up with a small publisher in Johannesburg and launched a magazine, "Transport World Africa," dedicated to analysis and debate about the African continent's transport infrastructure crisis. His experience in Mozambique confirmed that high transport costs in Africa, and from Africa to overseas markets, were seriously reducing

competitiveness of African products. He never planned to get into journalism, but it was a refreshing change and a real challenge. He recalls spending many days travelling the back roads of South Africa in an un-air conditioned Mazda3, interviewing CEOs about logistics bottlenecks and selling advertising for the new publication.

In 2004, he returned to USAID for a "second time around." In Afghanistan he helped the Mission find ways to address the narcotics challenge and served as a senior advisor to the Minister of Agriculture. From 2005 through 2013, he served in senior USAID positions on an interim basis in six Near East and Asian countries and in the Asia Bureau in Washington. He remains available for short-term assignments.

Roger and Gail's children, Caroline and Kevin, were born in Tunisia in the mid-1970's. Tragically, Gail died unexpectedly in 2009. Roger's children and their spouses now live in Florida and Roger thoroughly enjoys his role as grandfather to four boys between the ages ten and three. During school holidays he often joins them in Florida and runs what the boys like to call "Camp Gramp!" While Roger still resides in D.C., he spends time on

Cape Cod, maintaining a family home and summer rental property near the National Seashore Park. It has become a wonderful retreat, winter and summer, for the Carlson clan.
